Kichxáan (Ketchikan) was a Tlingit summer fish camp around the mouth of Kichxáan Héeni (Ketchikan Creek). Ketchikan remains the home of the Taant'a Kwáan (Sea Lion Tribe) of the Tongass Tlingit.

GRANTS

Improving artifact storage at the Tongass Historical Museum is an on-going effort. Through Museums Alaska's Collections Management Fund Grant, we secured a grant in the amount of \$19,994 to purchase two new textile cabinets to provide much needed flat storage for fragile garments, leather, and fur.

The cabinets were custom built by Delta Designs in Topeka, Kansas, and delivered to Ketchikan in the fall. They are made of powder-coated steel, a material preferred by museums because of its durability and resistance to corrosion. With the extra space, we can rearrange overcrowded boxes, unfold previously folded items, and move fragile hanging textiles to prevent irreversible damage. As the project develops, we will be inventorying the new locations, photographing textiles, and updating database records for approximately 400 objects.

KETCHIKAN HISTORIC COMMISSION

With three National Historic Districts (Downtown, Creek Street, and Stedman-Thomas), Ketchikan offers a snapshot of how a thriving, modern community honors its historic buildings. The Historic Commission serves as a facilitator for these efforts.
